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Some Tips Concerning Social Media

Watch Out For Ungodly Influences.

One of the great dangers of social media is there are many who often post dirty jokes, use filthy language, and fill their page with all kinds of ungodly photos. Therefore, one needs to remember to choose their friends carefully (Proverbs 12:26). Remember to always deny ungodliness and worldly lust (Titus 2:12), and always keep in mind the fact that evil associations corrupt good habits (1 Corinthians 15:33).

Do Not Let Social Media Become An Addiction.

The amount of time that people are spending on social media is constantly increasing, and a recent poll revealed that the average person now spends about two hours per day on social media. You see, the point is, one needs to be careful lest they become addicted to social media. So, hold onto these words of the apostle Paul, "All things are lawful for me, but not all things are helpful. All things are lawful for me, but I will not be brought under the power of any" (1 Corinthians 6:12).
