### January 21 2024 THE HABITUAL FAULT-FINDER WITH HIS UNJUST CRITICISM

If you have lived very long in this world, there is one fact of life that you have learned by experience. That fact is that people will find fault no matter what you do! Fault-finding can become a bad habit which will change your whole outlook on life. It is a habit that is easily developed and hard to break. It does not take a lot of mentality or ability to be an habitual fault-finder.

We have found, by experience, that most of the time your most severe critics are those who do nothing, but they know how you ought to do everything! These people are never satisfied with anything that is done, and the reason is that they are more dissatisfied with themselves than anyone else! They do nothing, and many times are without the ability to do, so they try to soothe their own conscience by finding all the short-comings in others. These unjust critics in a congregation are of great hindrance to the work. They won't do the work themselves, and discourage those who will (and do) with their unjust criticism.

We are made to wonder sometimes how these people can worship God acceptably, as they are so busy during the worship finding all the mistakes the song leader, the one leading prayer, and the preacher make! They first pick the one who makes the announcements to pieces because his grammar was bad or he did not speak loudly enough, or maybe he had a nervous habit. When the song leader starts the first song he gets it a little too high, and this is his "unpardonable sin". Then comes the prayer, and the brother is a little "long-winded" -- and this is just too much -- this man has just got to go! The preacher rises to preach and they wonder why he picked that subject -- they say that "it is not needed here" (they always know what is needed better than anybody). While they are upset with the preacher over the sermon, they begin to think about all his other faults and the mistakes he made during the past week; the bulletin he edited was not up to their high standard--he should have written it all himself and not reprinted articles by someone else! In the critic's mind the preacher does not have much to do anyway, and a good article can be written in fifteen minutes! The critic has forgotten that good sister Faithful died on Monday and the preacher was busy comforting the family and getting up a little something to say that would be fitting at her funeral; besides, several were sick and in the hospital who had to be visited; he also had to study for his Wednesday night lesson and begin to think about what he is going to preach on Sunday; and some personal work just had to be done; and Mr. Interested had to be baptized Tuesday night; and, you know, the preacher does have a family who has a right to some attention!

But the critic is not going to take all these things into consideration before he comes forth with his profound wisdom and criticism! To he who makes no mistakes and knows it all, everybody else should be perfect too! He just cannot stand human imperfection in his presence!

Brother or sister, examine your heart and ask yourself, "Am I guilty of some of the attitudes mentioned in this article?" If you are guilty, realize the sinfulness of such an attitude. Jesus said, "Judge not, that ye be not judged. For with what judgment ye judge, ye shall be judged; and with what measure ye mete, it shall be measured to you again." (Matt. 7: 1 - 2).
